#### Family & Work

- Families would often have multiple generations and extended family, cousins, grandparents etc, in one house
- Mum was the housekeeper, as well as earning money as a dressmaker, and dad was a farmer and a watchman (security guard)
- Farming was quite common in Jamaica in the 60s.
   Agriculture farming of coffee, bananas, cocoa and sugar and also vanilla, pimento, ginger and tobacco.
   Animal Husbandry, rearing cattle and other livestock.
   Fishermen, Forestry, Mining, clerical work.

#### **Food**

- Breakfast Fried Dumpling, Bread, Ackee, Porridge, Hot drinks, Hot Chocolate
- Lunch Bread, Porridge, Bulla and Fritters,
   Lemonade, Cornmeal, Potato Pudding, Polenta
- Dinner Banana, Yam, Breadfruit, Potato Dumpling,
   Chicken or Pork or Prawns (known as Swims)
- Popular Dishes Ackee and Saltfish, Rice and Peas, Chicken Stew, Dip and Fall Back (cho cho and Saltfish), Pepperpot Soup

## **Typical Day**

Wake up early around 6.00am, complete household chores before school, after breakfast would walk to school, which started at 8.00am. We would walk with other children in the neighbourhood. We wore school uniform every day. Our lessons were done using slates and chalkboards. We spent a lot of time reciting for learning, learning poems and scriptures of the bible. We would go home for lunch and return in time for the next lesson. We played games at school, called Dandy Shandy\*, Baseball, Jax (Jacks)\*\*, Skipping and Hide and Seek. School ended at 3.00pm, we would walk home and then help out with any household chores. Older girls would help to prepare the evening meal, otherwise it would just be mum. If on a farm, would

help look after the animals. Then homework would need to be done, spellings, reciting poems and knowing scripture verses. Dinner would be around 6pm and we would all eat together, at times sitting outside on the verandah or steps of the house.

Nightfall was around 6.45pm and dad would read stories, mainly Ananci stories. Ananci, meaning Spider, was a folktale character who would be considered the God of all Stories. (More information on these stories can be found https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Anansi) and actual stories are published on line too As there was no electricity in the home, there was no TV only a small transistor radio. Light was supplied by Kerosene lamps. Bedtime was at 8pm

**Typical Day (continued)** 

\*Dandy Shandy — a playground ball game, where a ball is thrown by one of the players to a player standing in the middle and they must do all they can to prevent the ball from hitting them, by jumping, leaping, ducking to avoid this. An exciting game that was considered a girls game but boys would often play too (similar to Dodge Ball in the US, but the ball would be made out of a milk box stuffed with paper, some wet, to make it really effective for throwing)

\*Jax (Jacks) (Jax are small pronged metal or plastic pieces, in a set of 10)

played with a small bouncy ball. The Jaxs would be thrown on the surface, a player throws the ball up in the air giving it enough height for you to pick up a jax before the ball bounces and then catch, with the same hand. Pass the jax to the opposite hand and throw the ball up again and keep going picking up the jax, as many as you can before the ball drops or if you drop a jax. Play then moves to the next player. The person who caught the most jax is the winner

## **Entertainment/Other**

There would be street dances, usually reserved for adults.

Church was attended every Sunday and afterwards would go to nearby rivers or fields to play Christianity was and still is the most popular religion in Jamacia. There would be praise, worship, sermons, readings or scriptures, several prayers and singing of hymns. Most popular Psalms can be found on additional attachment

Junkanoo is Independence day celebrated on August 6th – people would dress in different costumes and parade in the streets. This would be a big event celebrated each year https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Junkanoo Grand Market - this was more for children in more rural areas on Christmas Eve and all communities would have major shopping and eating and greeting people and this is still a big event continuing to be celebrated now. However it is also celebrated on Christmas Day morning generally, with brightly decorated market stalls, bands playing, children dressing up in their new clothes and going to the market to see all the toys for sale. The highlight of every child's holiday.

Most popular music would be Reggae, Calypso and Gospel

Most favoured flowers in Jamacia are the Hibiscus, Fern and Cocoa Plant

If ever unwell we would look to herbal remedies more to help us get better, like drinking herbs and bush teas
